

Redistricting Overview



- Upon the release of the 2020 census, governing boards of local government bodies, including city councils, should review population changes to determine if districts are imbalanced and must be redrawn.
- Out-of-balance electoral districts may require the local government to rebalance the population among the districts.
- The districts shall be substantially equal in population according to the total population count as presented in the census data, except where <u>deviation</u> is required to comply with federal law or is allowable by law.





- There shall be no discrimination on the basis of race, color, or membership in a language minority group, and the voting strength of racial, ethnic, and language minorities in the districts shall not be diluted to deprive minority voters of an equal opportunity to elect a candidate of their choice.
- The districts shall be geographically compact, to the extent possible, and composed of <u>contiguous</u> territory





- The reconfiguration of districts shall be neutral as to incumbents or potential candidates.
- Communities of interest shall be placed in a single district and attempts should be made to avoid splitting neighborhoods, where possible without violating the other requirements.
- The redistricting commission may adopt any other requirements of federal or state law.





- Redistricting is governed by federal, state and local law.
- As it relates to federal law, cities remain subject to the nondiscrimination requirements of Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act.
- Section 5 Preclearance is no longer applicable.



Redistricting Overview



Proposed Redistricting Process – 4 Stages

- Stage 1 (October 2021- November 2021) Create a timeline and approve a process for public input, developing and accepting map plans and approving a final map plan
 - The Commission has adopted redistricting guidelines, Plan Submission Criteria and a timeline.
- Stage 2 (December 2021 February 2022) Town Halls throughout the City to gain in-depth knowledge and feedback from City of Dallas constituents.
- Stage 3 (December 2021 April 2022) Development, acceptance and presentation of plans.
- Stage 4 (April 2022 May 2022) Approve a final plan for presentation to the Mayor.



Map Analysis: 2 Preferred Maps as of 5-2-22




COD-017-A Max Dev – 9.06%; Neighborhood Splits - 49

Number of Districts with Polsby Popper Compactness Scores < .2 - 5




Map Analysis: Preferred Map – COD-017-A





Number of Districts with Polsby Popper Compactness Scores < .2 - 4




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
